Human trafficking is big business. And it's growing. The orbits of human trafficking and prostitution have now intersected to create a rapidly expanding criminal enterprise. What's been known to law enforcement authorities for several years has become a new reality for gaming regulators—casinos and resorts can be ideal environments for human sexual trafficking. Unfortunately, a willing and complicit customer pool complicates detection and suppression because members of that pool are sometimes known by other familiar names, like customers. Or patrons. Or even high rollers.

While human trafficking enterprises have found their way into a variety of otherwise legitimate commercial spaces, hotels have always provided a convenient base of operations. More recently, casinos and resorts have become even more favored venues to conduct the illegal operations. That's probably because human trafficking is only one part of a more complex web of criminal pursuits. It is not unusual to find that with trafficking operations come ancillary business ventures like narcotics trafficking and money laundering.
